Recipe for "Fertilizer Cakes" Now that there not much happening with bonsai, it would be very practical to start preparing some slow release fertilizer to be ready for Spring. (Taken from BCI magazine, Jan/Feb 1987)

Dry ingredients: 4 parts cottonseed meal, 2 part blood meal, 1 part bone meal, and a little powdered Sevin (an insecticide) and an animal repellent

Liquid ingredients: Some form of liquid fertilizer and trace elements.

Step 1--Mix all of the dry ingredients and set aside what you don't need at the moment. About 2/3 of a standard sized bucket of dry ingredients produces enough fertilizer for about 100 medium to large bonsai. Store leftover dry fertilizer in an airtight container for later use.

Step 2--Put the equivalent of a single application into a bucket, mix liquid fertilizer with the dry mixture, and stir until you have something with about the consistency of oatmeal cookies ready to cook.

Step 3--Use the melon baller to scoop the balls directly onto the bonsai soil surface. You need to apply a bit of pressure against the side of the bucket to get them to stick together. Or use rubber gloves and make 1" balls, flatten them a little bit so they will not roll away, and place them on the soil. Apply about once a month.

WINTER BONSAI TIPS, by Alan Walker

Although your bonsai require very little attention this time of the year, don't neglect them in the rush of December. Root rot can become a big problem, if you haven't modified your watering procedure from the summer. Make sure that you water only when your bonsai soil has gotten on the dry side. Your deciduous trees are not transpiring when their leaves have fallen, and the cool temperatures do not promote much evaporation, so your trees are not using much water: f you've been collecting and had to prune your newly collected material, be sure to seal all the cuts. They won't really start to heal until dormancy ends and by the exposure to winter winds will draw moisture from the wounds faster than the traumatized root system can replenish it. Coat all the cut areas with Calsmate or some other sealant to give that new addition a chance to survive.

December is a good time to rewire, since the branches wont begin to swell with growth again until dormancy ends. Be careful with your deciduous material, though. Even though they are denuded and easier to wire, there is less sap in the branches now, making them more brittle.

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RULES OF WIRING

When Marco Invernizzi was here, he gave us these "Rules of Wiring" while he was working on his demo tree. Thanks to Jane and Randy for taking notes for us to print here. There are no excuses now for not wiring nor for having poor wiring! Start practicing!

- 1. The size of the wire (aluminum) must be 1/3 of the size of the branch. In case of the Kingsville boxwood the size of the wire could be 1/2 of the size of the branch.
- 2. Wire 2 branches of almost the same size with one piece of wire.
- 3. Wire 2 branches not too close or not too far from each other. Do not join branches opposite each other.
- 4. If there is only one branch left (odd number), join it with another branch or or jin to anchor it
- 5. When the size of the branch changes, the size of the wire must change as per rule #1.
- 6. Do not leave any gaps between the wire and the branch; the wire must always touch the branch.
- 7. When you want to bend a branch downwards, the wire must pass from above the branch.
- 8. When you want to lift a branch, the wire must pass from underneath.
- 9. When you want to bend the branch to the front, the wire must pass from the back.
- 10. When you want to bend the branch to the back, the wire must pass from the front.

Note: In order to follow rules 7, 8, 9, and 10, you <u>must know</u> how you are going to bend a branch before you wire it!

- 11. The position of the branch, when you wire it, must be 45 degrees to your body.
- 12. When you wire a branch use the dominant hand to wrap the wire, and use the other hand to support the branch and ensure that the wire is in contact with the branch.
- 13. The end of the wire should end upwards (like a hook) in order to support the branch.

WINTER BONSAITIPS (cont'd):

Your pines, junipers, and most other evergreens are still fairly pliable. As always, remember to use wire that is harder to bend than the branch is to train. That way you won't need to put your branches at risk from over bending in order to get the correct angle to stay. Also, the heavier wire will be less likely to scar the branch, if you don't notice the branch thickening in time.

Prepare soil now for the potting season. There are so many things to do in the early spring, that any early preparation done now will be appreciated then. Tag any trees which will need repotting. Now is the time to order pots, so they'll be there when you need them.

The slow winter season is a good time to photograph your bonsai. Your deciduous material is fully exposed, and there's nothing like a black and white photograph of a tree to reveal flaws in the branch arrangement. This can be your blue print for pruning in the spring. Your photographs may also reveal a better front or potting angle. Keep these photographs with your record book. It can be quite rewarding to look over your bonsai records and note how your trees have progressed over the years. Bring your records to one of our general workshops or the meeting to get suggestions from other members for shaping and design.
